### 1. Quick Check-In Around the Table Related to BH and COVID-19

- a. Diana Koelliker noted increase of alcohol related calls in the emergency department
- b. Collaborative members agreed that often community members are not getting proper follow up treatment plans after crisis calls
  - i. Agreed that the crisis response from CORE is working well, but follow up is not
  - ii. Collaborative suggested that the Behavioral Health Care Coordinator connects those to proper follow up services after a crisis call
- c. CORE responder Lauren Oliver noted significant amount of crisis calls during off season
  - i. Sited housing crisis as risk factor
  - ii. Noted more children calling for crisis response
- d. Collaborative members agreed that biggest need for county is more providers in the area
  - i. Most therapists and clinicians have waiting lists
  - ii. The more providers there are, the fewer clients current providers will need to take, lessening the burn out of local therapists
  - iii. No therapist located in Norwood
    - 1. Leads to transportation barriers
- e. Collaborative emphasized need to develop workforce
  - i. Discussed the idea of practicum internships to develop solid, local clinicians
- f. Members agreed on the need to nurture therapists already working in the community
- g. Collaborative members discussed the need for the Center for Mental Health to handle crisis calls with trauma-informed practices and to properly hand off to other crisis responders (CORE) when necessary
  - i. Examples shared about not handing off to CORE
  - ii. Example shared about asking financial information during crisis call, which is not consistent with the Center for Mental Health's information on mobile crisis response on its website

### 2. Behavioral Health Data Presentation (Corinne Cavender)

a. Corinne Cavender presented data collected from San Miguel Resource Center, Telluride Marshal's Office, San Miguel Sherriff's Office, Tri-County Health Network,

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San Miguel County Coroner, Telluride Regional Medical Center, Telluride Regional Medical Center Emergency Department, and CORE.

- 3. Crisis Services Update (Diana Koelliker, Mandy Miller, Robin Slater)
  - a. Diana Koelliker, Mandy Miller, Robin Slater, and Corinne Cavender met previously to discuss ways to create a team to respond to clusters of situations that we encounter as a county-wide problem
    - i. Ex. Overdoses, suicides, etc.
  - b. Koelliker, Miller, Slater and Cavender referenced past community crisis and how a crisis team have could have responded in a unified manner to be more effective in helping the community
    - i. The group shared its initial draft of what the response and team would look like
  - c. Next step is finding someone to lead the crisis response team
    - i. With Emergency Manager leaving the county, need to figure out who is best fit
    - ii. Discussed potentially asking the Solutions Panel for funding for the head of this team

### 4. Community Support Group Update (Jennie Thomas)

- a. Jennie Thomas updated the Collaborative on her free Community Support Group occurring Mondays at 6pm via Zoom
  - i. Getting few but consistent participants
  - ii. Group has been better marketed

### 5. San Miguel Behavioral Health Solutions Panel Update

- a. Behavioral Health Care Coordinator
  - i. Tri-County Health Network has hired for the position
- b. Good Neighbor Fund
  - i. The Solutions Panel is in the process of creating a new funding mechanism instead of the Good Neighbor Fund
- c. Agency Funding
  - i. The agencies funded through the Agency Pilot Fund are wrapping up their grant cycles and turning in annual reports by June 15
- d. Professional Development
  - i. No new providers have applied for professional development stipends

## 6. Mental Health Awareness Month

- a. Tri-County Health Network is hosting a Community Resource Fair occurring Monday, May 24<sup>th</sup> in honor of Mental Health Awareness Month
  - i. Free yoga classes Wednesdays during May from 4pm-5pm
  - ii. Free Youth Mental Health First Aid class Thursday May 20th
- b. Bright Futures hosting Mindful May on Wednesdays from 7pm-8pm

### 7. West End Services Brainstorm (Shannon Dean)

- a. Collaborative discussed lack of services, not just providers, in the west end of the county
  - i. Discussed bringing issue to Solutions Panel

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- b. CORE program working well in west end of county
  - i. This has helped identify people who need services, but due to lack of resources/providers services are not being offered
